Let's look at **Feena's Second Book of Facts**. Most of you should have it, but I will put up screen shots too.

Look at page 4. This is called a Table of Contents. You would usually find one at the start of a book to guide you through it. It is very useful in a fact book like this one, as it helps you to find the information you need quickly.

No need to read the whole book if you are looking for particular information. Just look under the themes. Let's say I want to read about dolphins. They belong to the theme of Sea Life and so I scan down through the category and find that all about dolphins is on page 60. I can even work out how long an article is, eg The Brain is on pages 18-19 - that is 2 pages long.

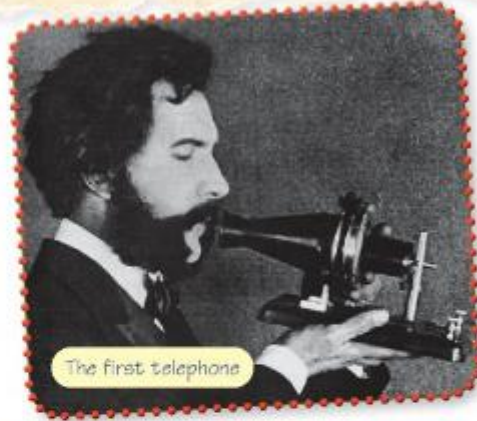
Telephones

The telephone is one of those inventions we cannot imagine living without.



Who invented the telephone?

In 1876 the telephone was invented by Alexander Graham Bell. Using his telephone, people could talk to each other even if they were hundreds of kilometres apart.



Feena's Fact

Alexander Graham Bell was always interested in sound because both his mother and his wife were deaf.



Who invented the first mobile phone?

The first hand held mobile phone was invented by Dr Martin Cooper in 1973. It weighed just over a kilogram – that's as heavy as a bag of sugar! Its battery could only last for 30 minutes and it took 10 hours to recharge.

Machines in the Home

The way we live has been completely changed by the arrival of electricity into homes at the beginning of the 20th century. This led to the invention of **appliances** (machines) that have made life much easier.



How does a fridge keep food fresh?

Food stays fresh for longer if it is kept cool. A special liquid running through coils at the back of a fridge, keeps the inside cool. It does this by **absorbing** (taking) heat from the inside of the fridge.



Feena's Fact

People long ago discovered that salt water **absorbs** (takes in) heat as it evaporates. In order to keep food cool, it was placed in containers of salt water.



microwave oven



How do microwaves work?

A microwave oven can heat up food much more quickly than a normal oven can. To do this, it uses invisible waves called **microwaves**. Microwaves can travel through air and water. Food contains water, so microwaves can travel through it to heat it. The plate turns around so the microwaves go into all parts of the food.



What happened to the leopard that fell into the washing machine?

Answer: He came out spotless!





How do toasters toast bread?

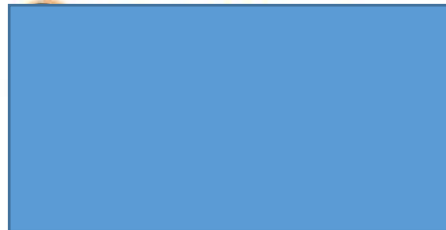
Toasters have coiled up wires inside that make heat. This heat toasts the bread.



Electric toasters have **timers** which make the bread pop up when it has toasted for a set time. This usually stops the toast from burning!

Feena's Fact

Toasting bread was a common activity in Roman times. It was used as a way of making bread last longer.

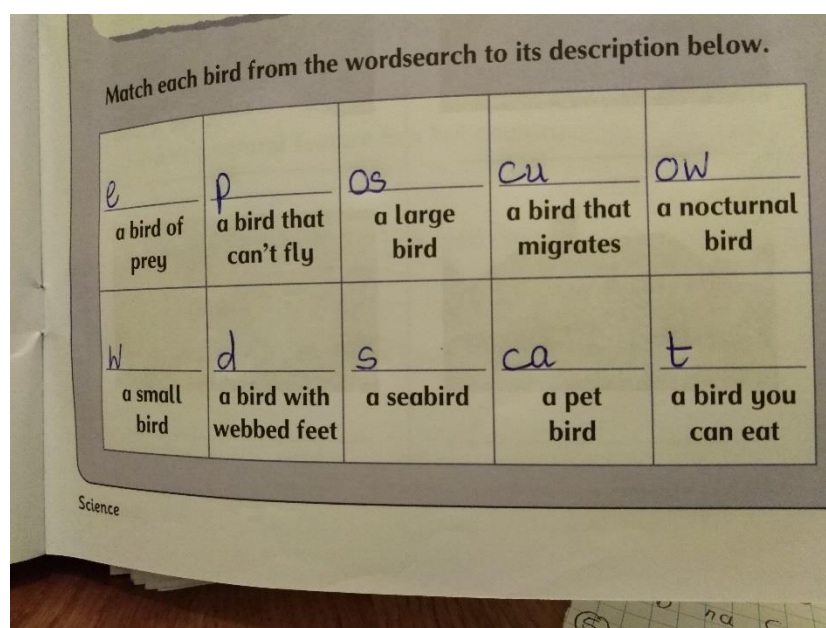
