

Reading

Weeds and Plants in Ireland

When you are out in your garden or in any green area, you may be lucky enough to see lots of flowers. Some of these flowers are <u>cultivated</u> flowers and some of them are <u>weeds</u>.

How do we tell the difference?

Plants which are <u>intentionally</u> grown in a garden or another area are called cultivated plants. Any plants that are not wanted, or that are not meant to grow there, are known as weeds.

Even though weeds are unwanted, we must remember that they can still

be beautiful and useful! Dandelions are a beautiful, <u>vibrant</u> yellow colour that grow in grass. While these are <u>considered</u> weeds, they are actually the bees' and other <u>pollinators'</u> first food of the season! So, even though they are weeds, they are very important for <u>ensuring</u> our pollinators get enough nourishment to continue doing their jobs.



Nettles are considered weeds also. These plants can sting you if you



touch their stem or the underside of their leaves. They are covered in sharp hairs that inject an irritant into your skin if you touch it. Even though nettles are unsightly and can sting, there are some positives to them too! Nettle leaves have historically been brewed to make a refreshing tea. Today some people still drink nettle tea, but many opt to buy

teabags rather than risking picking the leaves themselves!

Dock leaves are another weed that many people know of as they are a

simple way to soothe a nettle sting. These weeds often grow close to nettles which is useful if you've just been stung! Dock leaves contain sap that soothes nettle stings.





Finally, some weeds are just fun to play with! Buttercups are a beautiful yellow colour and many people believe that if you hold a buttercup flower under someone's chin, it will tell you whether or not they like butter! Daisies are a well-known weed also and

many children have passed happy hours making daisy chains to be worn as crowns, necklaces and bracelets.

There are many other weeds that are **common** in Ireland, can you think of any others?



As an activity, why not make your own picture postcard!


Activity: Making a picture postcard


Method

- 1. Take your old photograph and turn the photograph upside down
- 2. Create your postcard by using the template below
- 3. Using your pen and ruler, divide the template into two-thirds and one-third



4. Write the recipient's name and address (person you are sending it to) on the right hand side of the postcard

5. Write the date on the top right hand side of the larger section.



- 6. Start your postcard by stating 'Dear (person's name)'
- 7. Write your handwritten message (maybe include a joke)
- 8. Sign your postcard, e.g. 'Bye for now, (your name)'



10. Get an adult to post the picture postcard!
